### Title: What About Bear?


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Repeat the Book: Repeating gives more chances to learn the vocabulary.

**First Read (events)** - Look at the cover, read the title, and say "I wonder what the bear is going to find in the suitcase? Let's read and find out." The Fox keeps changing the games he wants to play. Talk about how Bear cannot play the games that Fox chooses. Bear finally gives up and starts to walk away - talk about what your child think might happen next. After reading, ask the questions in the "Ask Questions" section.

**Second Read (emotions)** - Before reading, say "I wonder if Bear enjoys playing with his friends. Let's read and find out." As you read, talk about how Bear is feeling each time Fox changes the game. Talk about making sure everyone can have fun playing together. Ask the second read question.

**Third Read (retell)** - Before reading, say "I wonder if Bear got to play with his new friend, Fox. Let's read and find out." Talk about how Goose solved the problem of Bear not getting to play. Ask your child about other ways the problem could have been solved. Ask the third read questions.



#### Vocabulary

Use these words when you talk with your child this month

grumpy - in a bad mood

friend - someone who you like and trust

different - not the same

splendid - very special

game - something you

far - not close



**Engage and Enjoy:** Using these activities keeps your child's interest in the story.

Role play with your child using stuffed animals or dolls to retell the story. Allow your child to act as one of the characters. During the retelling, say "Sharing helps everyone have a good time." When playing with your child be sure and thank him/her for sharing their toys with you.



Ask Questions: After talking about the book, ask questions to promote deeper thinking.

After the first read, ask "Why does Goose keep asking 'What About Bear?" After the second read, ask "How did Goose feel when he realized that Bear was not getting to play? After the third read, ask "Why did Goose and Bear choose jumping rope?"



**Do More:** Use other activities to help your child connect vocabulary to their world outside of the story.


